

Zamora, Emilio



Zamora, a professor in the Department of History at the University of Texas at Austin, writes and teaches on the history of Mexicans in the United States, Texas history and oral history. He has prepared or collaborated in the production of nine monographs: three single-authored books, a translated and edited WWI diary, three co-edited anthologies, a co-edited eBook, and two Texas history texts. Zamora has also published numerous scholarly articles, book reviews, and essays for popular consumption. He has received seven best-book awards, a best-article prize, and a Fulbright García-Robles fellowship. His latest recognitions include the 2017 Scholar of the year from the National Association for Chicana and Chicano Studies (NACCS) and the NACCS Tejas Foco Premio Estrella de Aztlán Lifetime Achievement Award 1917. Zamora is a lifetime member of the Texas Institute of Letters, a lifetime Fellow with the Texas State Historical Association (TSHA), and a Fellow of the George W. Littlefield Professorship in American History at the University of Texas. He has a robust record of community engagement, including President of

TSHA (2019-20) and a founding member of Nuestro Grupo, the major sponsor of Academia Cuauhtli / Cuauhtli Academy, a Saturday morning language and cultural revitalization project in Austin.
