Dear Representative:

On behalf of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), the nation's oldest and largest Latino civil rights organization, I urge you to oppose any amendments to H.R. 240, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) appropriation bill for fiscal year 2016, which would seek to undo efforts by President Obama to enact meaningful immigration reform through administrative actions. More specifically, our organization is deeply troubled by language Representative Robert Aderholt is spearheading whose main message appears to be that Latino immigrants are not valued by this Congress.

According to reports, Rep. Aderholt's amendment to the DHS appropriation bill would prevent the President of the United States from exercising prosecutorial discretion to focus our nation's limited immigration enforcement resources on high priority targets. In essence, it would insist that our nation's immigration enforcement agencies target the hardworking immigrants who pick our food, clean our homes and offices, care for our children and countless other essential tasks as much as violent felons. In addition, our organization also strongly urges you to vote against the Blackburn, Salmon, DeSantis, and Schock, amendments.

LULAC has diligently worked for years with faith based organizations, businesses, and advocacy groups of every stripe to engage and educate members of Congress on the need for bipartisan, comprehensive immigration reform. While we were encouraged by the bipartisan display of support for S.744 in the Senate in the 113th session of Congress, our organization was disappointed that no comprehensive immigration reform legislation advanced through the House of Representatives. Today, we are deeply troubled that the 114th Congress has lined up amendments that are extreme, unnecessary, and do nothing to fix our broken immigration system. These attempts also go against the will of the American people. According to recent polling, over 89 percent of Latino voters approve of the President's actions, and over 60 percent of the general American public support President Obama's immigration policy reforms.


It is irresponsible for the House of Representatives to push amendments that would prevent the President from doing what he can to fix our broken immigration system - especially given the failure of the House of Representatives to pass its own comprehensive immigration reform bill. The Latino community sees these attempts, as well as the anti-immigrant rhetoric used by some Representatives in the House, as a political attack against Latino immigrants designed to appeal to a small but vocal group of radicalized anti-immigrant voters.

Close to two million immigrants have been deported during President Obama's time in office, separating countless families and slowing our economy. Because of Congress' inaction, President Obama has acted within his authority to provide limited and temporary relief to immigrants who meet very specific requirements. If the House of Representatives prefers Congressional over Presidential action (as LULAC does) then Congress should pass a comprehensive immigration reform bill instead of attempting to block President Obama's efforts to fix our broken immigration system.

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On behalf of the 135,000 members of LULAC, I urge you to oppose any legislation aimed at blocking President Obama's efforts to fix our immigration system.
